Friday, November 9, 2018

Chair Baxter called the meeting to order at 3:03 p.m.

Pledge of Allegiance – Chair Baxter

Roll Call: Chair Baxter, Members Benitez, Bernau, Bevan, Curulli, Gorbanovski, Ico, Nguyen, and Saunders were present. Molfino arrived at 3:05 p.m. Orozco and Rodriguez were excused. Zivkovic was absent. Dunkle was marked excused after a 2:35 p.m. voice mail was retrieved at 4:19 p.m. by the Recording Secretary after the meeting.

CHANGES TO AGENDA/ADOPTION OF AGENDA

Chair Baxter requested removing the Blessings in a Backpack from today's agenda.

Member Bevan moved, seconded by Vice Chair Bernau, to remove Blessings in a Backpack from today's agenda.

Council polled as follows: Baxter, Benitez, Bernau, Bevan, Curulli, Gorbanovski, Ico, Molfino, Nguyen, and Saunders voted "aye." 10 "ayes." Motion carried 10-0.

<u>Chair Baxter</u> requested postponing the Blue Green Algae topic to the next meeting agenda.

Member Benitez moved, seconded by Member Ico, to postpone the Blue Green Algae topic to the next meeting.

Council polled as follows: Baxter, Benitez, Bernau, Bevan, Gorbanovski, Ico, Molfino, Nguyen, Saunders, and Curulli voted "aye." 10 "ayes." Motion carried 10-0.

Chair Baxter asked for a motion to approve the agenda, as amended.

Member Gorbanovski moved, seconded by Member Molfino, to approve the agenda, as amended.

Council polled as follows: Baxter, Benitez, Bernau, Bevan, Curulli, Gorbanovski, Ico, Molfino, Nguyen, and Saunders voted "aye." 10 "ayes." Motion carried 10-0.

Vice Chair Bernau moved, seconded by Member Curulli, to approve the Regular Meeting Minutes from October 26, 2018, as presented. Voice Poll: All "ayes." Motion carried.

ADVISOR PRESENTATIONS

City Council Meeting Agenda Report Advisor Mazurkiewicz

Advisor Mazurkiewicz provided the following City Council Meeting Agenda Report:

- November 19th Council meeting discussion on the Comprehensive Land Use Plans which will drive a new Land Use Map and New Zoning and eventually new regulations.
- January 14th City of Cape Coral will adopt all new Land Use Regulations and complete Text Amendments to the Comprehensive Land Use Plan as well as a Land Use Map and Zoning Regulations.
- This will solidify and reduce the number of Zoning and Land Use categories within the City, as well as reduce the number of Public Hearings, and to grant staff additional flexibility in applying the Land Use Regulations.
- SE 47th Terrace improvement in Downtown will make it pedestrian-friendly
- This contemplates the building of vertically-integrated Mixed Use Commercial, Professional, and Residential, all in the same structure.
- Provides much greater flexibility, and more staff review rather than Public Hearing review for recording of plats.
- All the Zoning regulations and the Land Use will still be done by Public Hearing.
- Actual technical applications of how they fit in and go together will be more of a staff initiative.
- Encouraged the Youth Council members to attend the City Council meeting or watch it on tv.
- Pay special attention to the philosophical oversights that staff present prior to getting the technical applications of the regulations.
- If the Youth Council so desired, have input on how you would like to see this community look like before City Council adopts the final Land Use Map and Zoning Map and the final Land Development Regulations scheduled for January 14th.

<u>Chair Baxter</u> asked for input from the Youth Council. Echoing on that issue, the GO Bond passed this week. She agreed that the City is growing quickly, and it was important that the Youth Council have some input at the January meeting.

Advisor Mazurkiewicz stated it was interesting to see how the GO Bond went through the election cycle. The GO Bond was lost in the early voting by mail. When early voting was held at the precincts, it started gaining votes, winning on Election Day. The influence at the end clearly made a difference.

<u>Member Benitez</u> asked if the Youth Council should present input to Council on the Land Use Regulations similar to the presentation made on the GO Bond.

Advisor Mazurkiewicz stated once the final Ordinances are out for review and if the Youth Council takes a position, he recommended that they do a presentation.

<u>Member Ico</u> stated she would be willing to work on this with Member Benitez and asked if anyone else was interested.

A few of the members volunteered.

<u>Member Ico</u> opined that this should be added to one of the upcoming meeting agendas for discussion and put together a consensus from the Youth Council's ideas.

<u>Chair Baxter</u> asked if this should go to a meeting in mid-December so that there would be a few City Council meetings to listen to.

Advisor Mazurkiewicz suggested that the Youth Council request the Planning Department to come in and make a presentation. They can provide the highlights and their recommendations.

<u>Chair Baxter</u> stated once we get to the meeting agenda topics, she will try to get that date for the mid-December meeting so that we're able to put it on the agenda. She agreed it was a great idea and we should be giving more presentations at City Council meetings.

Council Liaison Williams stated with the moving of the Blue Green Algae to the next meeting, he asked if someone from the City should attend, especially since the problem is resurfacing.

Chair Baxter agreed.

Council Liaison Williams stated he will arrange for City staff to come to the meeting and brief the Youth Council on the latest.

Blue Green Algae and Red Tide – Chair Baxter – to the next meeting Approval of the Trifold Informational Literature

<u>Chair Baxter</u> stated Member Benitez was working on the draft and turned the floor over to her.

<u>Member Benitez</u> stated she sent an email and provided a copy of the draft. She reviewed the information included in the draft. On the last page she would like to include statistics and demographics of the importance of our youth in our City, but she was not able to find exact demographics online about youth in the City, so she requested information about statistics. She has also been searching for pictures. Layout should be done soon.

<u>Chair Baxter</u> stated she felt it would be important to include more about what we have done as a Council, our mission and vision as a Council rather than the vision of the City Government. Mention projects such as the GO Bond presentation or the Blessings in a Backpack fundraiser.

Member Ico commented on including meeting times and location.

<u>Chair Baxter</u> agreed since we approved our most recent schedule, it might be a good idea to include meeting dates through the rest of 2018, as well as what is planned for 2019. She noted the brochure stated every other Friday. She opined it would be better to provide more specific dates, if possible.

Youth Council Administrative Contact Griglin suggested adding the dates but to make sure it reads the second and fourth Friday of the month, rather than every other Friday. She stated it may be possible to make a mini calendar.

Member Bevan asked if it would be printed in color.

Council Liaison Williams responded in the affirmative.

Member Bevan asked if that was something to be taken out of the Youth Council budget.

Council Liaison Williams stated it would not be expensive.

Advisor Mazurkiewicz stated once we have a document that is good to go, we can get a price from the City since this will be done in-house.

Member Benitez agreed it would be effective to include the comments given. She

questioned if it would be outdated to include our past actions since it was going to be used for future Councils.

<u>Vice Chair Bernau</u> stated brochures can always be updated. It would be beneficial to include the actions that we have done so far.

<u>Member Curulli</u> suggested an additional value would be leadership since we represent our schools.

<u>Chair Baxter</u> requested that Communications Director DeLong send some pictures that Member Benitez included, for example: a group picture and pictures of some kids in the City. She felt it should be more adaptable to the youth rather than the City as a whole. The brochure should be centralized around the Committee.

Discussion held to include contact information: twitter, Facebook, and Youth Council email.

<u>Member Benitez</u> summarized she will be adding in past actions to the first page of the brochure, as well as the leadership value with a description, and a calendar for the rest of 2018 and the beginning of 2019. She will try to format that with Ms. Griglin. She will add our contact information, wherever possible.

Advisor Mazurkiewicz provided some recommendations in the language of the last paragraph: "The Cape Coral City Youth Council is an advisory group that works towards identifying *meeting the needs* of Cape Coral's youth. The Council acts *in an advisory role to Council* on issues pertinent to our City, *bringing* forward recommendations on topics to the City Council and *controls* a budget for potential projects within the *City*."

Council Liaison Williams stated the important item to note is that the Youth Council represents the youth of the City. The youth should know what you can do for them and what they can do for you. If you include the website, the dates are already there.

<u>Chair Baxter</u> asked Member Benitez if she would be able to provide another draft at the next meeting.

Member Benitez responded in the affirmative.

Blessings in a Backpack Fundraiser – Chair Baxter – removed from agenda

Council polled as follows: Baxter, Benitez, Bernau, Bevan, Curulli, Gorbanovski, Ico, Molfino, Nguyen, and Saunders voted "aye." 10 "ayes." Motion carried 10-0.

Parks and Rec has been busy with Coconut Festival, and she has been unable to set up an appointment to talk with them about it. 

*36 dead dolphins washed onto Lee and Collier counties beaches the past week and hundreds of dead mullets were reported at Cayo Costa State Park beach

*All Shellfish Harvest Areas from Gasparilla Sound to Ten Thousand Islands are closed due to Red Tide.



Dead wildlife: Caloosahatchee, estuary, canals, back bays, Sanibel, Fort Myers beaches & Islands Lee County has removed 2,200 tons of dead marine life. Sanibel = 425 tons




What the City of Cape Coral is doing to combat Red Tide and Blue Green Algae

Karenia brevis Florida Red Tide Produces brevetoxins

Mostly saltwater >24 PSU



Microcystis aeruginosa
One specie of Cyanobacteria,
aka blue green algae
Produces cyanotoxins called microcystins
Mostly freshwater <17 PSU



What is the City doing to combat Red Tide (and Blue Green Algae)?

- Monthly water quality monitoring
- -Weekly regional scientists call:
 to assess conditions
 to discuss solutions
 to report to City Council periodically
 as well as to State agencies and Legislature



- Monitoring, Modeling and Forecasting are essential \rightarrow research

- Inform and protect the public from the effects of Red Tide


