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# MINUTES FOR THE SPECIAL MEETING OF THE CAPE CORAL CITY COUNCIL

September 12, 2024

Council Chambers

5:05 p.m.

Meeting called to order by Mayor Gunter at 5:05 p.m.

#### PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Roll Call: Mayor Gunter, Councilmembers Carr, Cosden, Hayden, and Welsh were present. Councilmembers Long, Sheppard, and Steinke were excused.

### CITIZENS INPUT TIME

Glen Snyder voiced concern about reoccurring flooding issues in his neighborhood. He questioned a study reportedly done by the City that addressed specific issues.

Jay Higgins expressed opposition about opening the Police Union contract. He supported keeping the Police Department agreement as is.

Chris Doyon voiced concerns about the drainage in his neighborhood. For past 19 years, there has been a need for a sheet flow to prevent flooding and underwater conditions.

Grace Giliberti expressed concerns about the removal of the Chiquita Lock and Jaycee Park changes. She encouraged Council not to change the zoning for Redfish Point. She requested assistance with the letter from FEMA that she received.

<u>Mayor Gunter</u> requested that Staff speak with the last speaker to assist with the FEMA inquiry. He requested feedback on the Public Works issue.

City Manager Ilczyszyn explained there would be a Public Works case analysis of the situation. There were projects done to alleviate flooding which did not address the entirety of the situation. South of Celebration was done as part of the Nicholas Parkway improvements. East and north sides still have additional work to be done. The Public Works Director and Stormwater Staff are putting together a permanent solution. Hopefully, it will be designed, permitted, and infrastructure to help the neighborhood before the next rainy season.

# WHAT THE ORDINANCE ACCOMPLISHES:

An ordinance of the Mayor and City Council of the City of Cape Coral, Florida, to establish and levy ad valorem taxes within the corporate limits of the City of Cape Coral, Florida, for the tax year 2024; providing for the levy of ad valorem taxes in the amount of 5.2188 mills (\$5.2188 per \$1,000) based on the assessed value on non-exempt real and personal property located within the city limits of the City of Cape Coral; providing for the levy of ad valorem taxes in the amount of 0.1791 mills (\$.1791 per \$1,000) based on the assessed value of the appropriate real and personal property located within the city limits of the City of Cape Coral, for funds for annual debt service for the City of Cape Coral, Florida, General Obligation Bond (Bank of America), Series 2019 and the City of Cape Coral, Florida, General Obligation Bonds, Series 2021; providing for the manner of assessment and collection. (Brought forward by City Management)

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City Clerk Bruns read the title of the Ordinance.

The second and final public hearing was scheduled for September 26, 2024, in Council Chambers.

Interim Assistant City Manager Mason noted that his presentation will encompass both Ordinance 59-24 and Ordinance 60-24. He pointed out that the millage rate must be approved prior to the tentative budget. Slides consisted of the following:

Jay Higgins voiced support for the rolled-back rate.

Public Hearing closed.

Councilmember Hayden moved, seconded by Councilmember Welsh, to set the Tentative Operating Millage Rate at 5.2188 mills which is 2.55% above the rolled-back rate of 5.0888 and the tentative millage rate for the Parks General Obligation Bond at .1791 mills.

Councilmember Carr explained his reason for supporting his decision on Ordinance 59-24 as public safety is the number one concern. This has been discussed for months. The difference that came to light during the budget process was the significant disparity within a study that was received in that timeline. He agreed that contracts are meant to be upheld. There is still discussion on how that will transpire and may not require opening the contract.

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Council polled as follows: Carr, Cosden, Gunter, Hayden, and Welsh voted "aye." Five "ayes." Motion carried 5-0.

Councilmember Hayden moved, seconded by Councilmember Welsh, to set the Tentative Operating and Capital Budget at \$1,058,403,269.

Council polled as follows: Carr, Cosden, Gunter, Hayden, and Welsh voted "aye." Five "ayes." Motion carried 5-0.
